Capital work completed in 2015:

Installation of solar panels, heat pumps, and electric system

Capital work completed in 2016 (to date):

Installation of trusses to support Sanctuary roof, insulation of Sanctuary cap, replacement of some early 20th Century electrical wiring above Sanctuary

Capital work ahead in 2016:

Insulate Sanctuary walls, paint and repair exterior trim, review and attend to church tower assessment

Funds received in 2015:

\$46,033
