#### News from John and Jan Steffens

Dear Family and Friends,

We have very intermittent Wi-Fi at the monastery in Pokhara so I hope you all receive this update. Please feel free to share in the church newsletter and with others I may have forgotten. Though we would love to send pictures there isn't enough broadband so I will try to put into words our journey so far.



We have been in Nepal for a week now excluding travel time, several days in Kathmandu and surrounding places and now at the large Buddhist monastery where we are now staying for 6-7 days.

The dental clinic began yesterday for the monks and the area school children and the poor. As always the people especially touch our hearts in the deepest ways and the children are amazing as they are wherever we travel.

We rise at 5:30 for chanting and prayers at 6:00 in the temple with the older monks. Then breakfast and preparation for the arrival of the first patients. We are nestled in the high Himalayas and it is approaching monsoon season, so it is hot and dry and foggy so our view of the Himalayas is very limited. Thank God for the breeze which helps with 90 degree temps. Flights from Katmandu were cancelled yesterday due to fog and smog per a guest who just arrived.

Yesterday the team saw 200 children and adults for dental inspection and treatment. Many cavities, but with the smallest children, because of baby teeth, usually no treatment. Of course there is no fluoride. Of the two hundred, there were 50 extractions and fillings and screams and tears and very scared children. And as always the medical/dental team is amazingly wonderful. What a privilege to work alongside them.

We are teaching kids and adults alike how to brush their teeth. Each gets a new brush, stickers, silly bands and another little toy. We see filthy, underweight kids and others who look well.

We wash our clothes in a bucket and lock our windows so the monkeys can't get in. Aggressive big animals. Last night I squashed two cockroaches in our simple but adequate bedroom with running water and a shower, much appreciated at the end of the day.

The monks are great and funny and playful and they can now play Uno and Spot It. Tonight John is going to set up the badminton set we brought with us for the monks ages 6-??? adult. Yesterday John put up new basketball nets for the kids. They are grateful for everything.

We are reasonably well. I have a cold and congestion but decongestions help. We are tired at the end of the day due to work, fatigue, and the heat. We will walk to a Tibetan refugee camp near here tonight. We are still not certain what we will do for the last five-six days of our trip after the team leaves. We would like to fly north over the Himalayas but with the weather not certain we can do that.

We are profoundly grateful for the opportunity to serve in this manner and as always we always receive so much more than we give.

#### **IMPORTANT YARD SALE INFORMATION FOR MAY 28**

There will be sign-up sheets in the parlor on May 8. Please indicate what you plan to bring, and how you would like to help on Yard Sale Day. Posters will also be available for you to place in hairdressing salons, banks, libraries etc. PLEASE

REMEMBER TO ASK PERMISSION TO POST. (Hannaford, for example, does NOT allow yard sale postings.)

We know that past yard sales at other venues have been more hospitable regarding early drop offs and storage, and we do recognize the inconvenience of self-storage until the actual day, but it is a necessary evil, given the limitations of Helen's circumstances. However, we also know that the negatives are offset by the positive aspects of a well-established neighborhood yard sale that is eagerly anticipated at this time each year.

Therefore, it is ideal if you can bring things between 6.30 and 8.00 a.m. on the 28th. If you have big things, need to make other arrangements, or need help, please contact Helen. We ask for NO electronics to sell this year.

Likewise, cleanup and transporting left-overs must be done right after closing time (2 p.m), which means 'all hands on deck' for complete removal of all vestiges of the sale. (Our neighbors are very impressed by the seasoned job we do at the end. Little do they know how often we do this sort of thing routinely!)

Table categories will include plants, clothing, books, kitchen items, and house wares. We need to replenish books, which are more easily transported in smaller boxes or plastic bags. Cookies are the baked goods that sell best, packaged in small amounts for immediate consumption.

We'll keep you well-fed and hydrated for the duration.

**Annual Meeting -** Our Annual Meeting will be held on Sunday, May 15th. It is important that everyone attend this meeting.


