December Theme ~ Expectation

"My expectations were reduced to zero when I was 21. Everything since then has been a bonus." ~ Stephen Hawking



I'm sad to say that whatever holidays you may celebrate this month, and however you normally expect to celebrate them, things are bound to be different this year.

December can be a difficult month even during "normal" times, full of complex emotions and intense (or absent) family interactions, holiday shopping madness, and societal expectations of joy and goodwill despite the growing loss of sunlight and warmth. When you throw in a tension-filled presidential transition and a global pandemic, well, I'm thinking we're in for a wild ride, a rollercoaster of emotions, punctuated by small delights and big frustrations. And while many of us may be able to hide the toll this is taking on our spirits, the reality is that we can all probably use a little help in managing our expectations and processing our disappointments this year.

How, do I hear you shouting?


The problem of expectation occurs when we expect something to happen without good reasons for that expectation - for example, doing the same thing over and over and expecting a different outcome despite it never having worked in the past. Or, for example, expecting Christmas to be exactly the same as it has always been despite being in the middle of a pandemic this year.

BUT...when expectation is based on good reasons, on solid evidence, on positive past experience, that is when we can depend on the results. And yes, even then it is possible for the outcome to be different than what we had hoped it would be, but overall, our hope is well-founded, overall our faith will be rewarded.

In the Christian tradition – *our* tradition as Unitarians and Universalists – the four weeks leading up to Christmas are designated as a season called Advent, a time of waiting and preparation of the coming of Christ. More broadly defined – a time of rest and reflection as we wait *in expectation* for the return of Light to the world. And this expectation – that light <u>will return</u> is an expectation based on millions of years of natural cycles. As far as I know, the Earth's tilt on its axis hasn't changed much lately. If it ever does we'll have much bigger problems than how to do Christmas dinner over Zoom!

Here's my point: there are going to be disappointments this month and I'm sorry for that, but I can promise you that on December 21st light will begin its return and on December 25th Love will renew its promise to dwell among us all here on earth.

December Reflection Glimpses from the Roller Coaster



What a month it has been! If I had worked on this reflection over time, beginning on November 1st (prior to the election), or November 4th (before the election had been called), or even on November 7th (when the election was called), the range of my emotions would be plain to see.

The stretch of beautiful days at the beginning of November were an incredible gift. There was time to work on outdoor chores without extra clothing layers; time to open the windows in the house; time to sit and chat with friends just like it was summer; time for walking and taking in the beauty of the natural world.

As the daylight grows shorter, I am gradually getting used to the 'winter-ish' routine: getting up before the sun; keeping hat, gloves, and warm socks ready for action; cooking things like American chop suey or oven fried chicken for comfort; and thinking wistfully about the Fedco Seed Catalog.

Recent days have felt difficult to digest – the spiking Covid numbers; the ongoing challenges we face as a nation; and the heart aching choices around family gatherings, can feel overwhelming. Sometimes it is necessary to shut them out, read a book, take a walk, watch a movie, sit quietly. I find I am getting better at listening to myself and knowing when and how much of the outside world to let in.

Despite the difficulty of this time, I am buoyed by the sunlight; the birds at the feeder; talking on Zoom with friends and family; and seeing the faces of my church family on Sunday. We are all finding ways to weather this pandemic on our own, together. Our individual and collective resilience will see us through this extraordinary time. - Ginny Howe

Ministerial Relations Committee (MRT)

"What is it?" "Who's on it?" "What does it do?" "Why don't we know about it?" "Is it another name for the Committee on Ministries?"

These are some of the questions members and friends of our churches ask about the MRT or Ministerial Relations Team. Folks in the Saco & Biddeford church are even more confused because our church has both the MRT and the Committee on Ministries.

You may be surprised to know that the MRT is simply a group of three members from both churches appointed by Rev. Shay. We meet on a monthly basis to question, listen, reflect and advise on issues relating to our churches and minister. We are Tom Huber and Dee Ames from SUUC and Matt Gerken, Mark Young, and Donna Beveridge from UUCSB. Bev Brent from SUUC recently left the team and will be replaced by another member from Sanford. Each of us pays attention to Rev. Shay and our churches. We notice what is working well, focus on improvements rather than criticism, maintain respectful relationships, and operate, confidentially, as openly and honestly as possible.

To be more specific, the MRT provides Rev. Shay with support, provides valuable input into her annual evaluations while she is in preliminary fellowship, and gives feedback to her regarding challenges that may arise. The MRT also watches to be sure that Rev. Shay maintains a balanced work and personal life so that she fulfills her contract obligations but also takes care of herself.

The Committee on Ministries, on the other hand, evaluates all the various ministries and committees in the Saco church and provides support to individuals or groups when conflicts arise. The CoM was created during the time when we had no called minister. Once our two congregations called Rev. Shay, it was decided that we needed to create a combined Ministerial Relations – one specifically created to support our minister.

Feel free to talk to any of us about our roles on the team. And think about whether you would enjoy being a member as terms on the MRT rotate and end.




