
April 4th – *Practicing Resurrection: Easter Sunday* with Rev. Shay

From NPR Book Reviews: "Writing a one-volume history of the United States is, obviously, a daunting task. There's way too much to pack into one book. Lepore acknowledges that she's not able to cover everything: 'No one could. Much is missing in these pages.' She has chosen to look at America through the lens of the promises America has made to itself, and whether we've kept them."

Following is an excerpt from the epilogue of Jill Lapore's 2018 book *These Truths: A History of the United States*.

Can a people govern themselves by reflection and choice? Hamilton had wanted to know, or are they fated to be ruled, forever, by accident and force, lashed by the violence of each wave of a surging sea?

The ship of state lurched and reeled. Liberals, blown down by the slightest breeze, had neglected to trim the ship's sails, leaving the canvas to flap and tear in a rising wind, the rigging flailing. Huddled below decks, they had failed to plot a course, having lost sight of the horizon and their grasp on any compass. On deck, conservatives had pulled up the ship's planking to make bonfires of rage: they had courted the popular will by demolishing the idea of truth itself, smashing the ship's very mast.


It would fall to a new generation of Americans, reckoning what their forebears had wrought, to fathom the depths of the doom-black sea. If they meant to repair the tattered ship, they would need to fell the most majestic pine in a deer-haunted forest and raise a new mast that could pierce the clouded sky. With sharpened adzes, they would have to hew timbers of cedar and oak into planks, straight and true. They would need to drive home nails with the untiring swing of mighty arms and, with needles held tenderly in nimble fingers stitch new sails out of the rugged canvas of their goodwill. Knowing that heat and sparks and hammers and anvils are not enough, they would have to forge an anchor in the glowing fire of their ideals. And to steer that ship through wind and wave, they would need to learn an ancient and nearly forgotten art: how to navigate by the stars.

Update From Your Board of Management



Our March Board meeting took place on March 8th.

Marcel filled us in on research that is being done in preparation for replacing the furnace. Marcel, Bill Ouellette,

Howard Dupee, and Jeremy (who has held an important role in keeping our current furnace functioning) have been looking into options that may be more environmentally friendly than just replacing one furnace with another furnace. Cost is certainly a factor, but long-term savings will also be a factor. We will keep you posted with progress.

There will be a Zoom meeting with UU Regional Staff for our Board on March 22nd, for UUCSB's Board on March 24th, and jointly with both Boards on Saturday, March 27th. The topic of discussion is sustainable ministry – which includes our partnership with UUCSB and our support of Rev. Shay.

The Board decided that going forward, we will conduct most Board meetings virtually, especially in the winter. Since we have been meeting online, we have found that we are well able to carry on the work of the church remotely.

The Nominating Committee will be looking to fill 3 positions on the Board (1 liaison, and 2 at large members), and 1 Nominating Committee position. If you are interested in knowing more about the Board and our collaborative model, please reach out to one of us (Marcel Gagnon, Ginny Howe, Karen Nelson, Natasha Nolan, Judi Reis, Janie Waterhouse, Diane Whiteside-Peck) [Karen, and Diane's terms expire in June 2021 and an at large position is being added.]

It is encouraging to hear that many in our congregation are in the process of being vaccinated against COVID-19. There have also been some other cautiously optimistic signs that we will have fewer restrictions in the coming months. It is important that we continue to observe guidance from our medical and scientific community, while being mindful of our own feelings as we go out into the world.

Sanford UU Church Book Group

The book group will meet Friday, April 9th at 4:30 p.m. on Zoom. We will discuss *Caste: The Origins of Our Discontents* by Isabel Wilkerson.

It has been ten years since Wilkerson's award-winning *The Warmth of Other Suns* was published. While that book pointed to the great migration of Black people to the north as an "unrecognized migration," this new book points to our entire social structure as an unrecognized caste system. Pulitzer Prize-winning author Isabel Wilkerson says racism is



an insufficient term for the systemic oppression of Black people in America. Instead, she prefers to refer to America as having a "caste" system.

Wilkerson describes caste as an artificial hierarchy that helps determine standing and respect, assumptions of beauty and competence, and even who gets benefit of the doubt and access to resources. "Caste focuses in on the infrastructure of our divisions and the rankings, whereas race is the metric that's used to determine one's place in that," she says.

Wilkerson notes that the concept of caste has been around for thousands of years: "[Caste] predates the idea of race, which is ... only 400 or 500 years old, dating back to the transatlantic slave trade." Caste, she adds, "is the term that is more precise [than race]; it is more comprehensive, and it gets at the underlying infrastructure that often we cannot see, but that is there undergirding much of the inequality and injustices and disparities that we live with in this country."


