It's always hard to write these newsletter articles without knowing what will be happening in our world or in your lives when you read them. I'm writing this on Thursday, April 22nd - at least a week before you will read it, two days after you all received two letters from your Boards and me, and three days before we'll all sit down to start talking about what's happening. So where will things be in a week, when you open your email and find this article waiting for you?

I don't know the answer to that question. What I do know is that we will have many conversations over the next few weeks as we figure out what's next, and I know there will be many emotions and ideas and debates, and sometimes it will all feel very heavy.

So, how about I write about something not-so-heavy right now?


In her book *The Life-Changing Magic of Tidying Up: The Japanese Art of Decluttering and Organizing*, Japanese organizing consultant Marie Kondo says, "The question of what you want to own is actually the question of how you want to live your life."

When my partner Diana and I were finally able to combine households and move into a shared apartment last summer, we made a deliberate choice towards voluntary simplicity – a decluttering of our lives, both materially and emotionally. With each item we packed, we followed Marie Kondo's advice to pick it up, hold it for a moment, and ask, "Does this spark joy in me?"

Ultimately, we shifted our frame of reference from "What do I want to get rid of?" to "What do I want to keep?" This led to many Goodwill trips and dump runs, many Facebook Marketplace and Craigslist ads. And as we moved into our new apartment and unpacked and found ourselves with more space than we needed, everything changed. Even Diana's son Aidan got involved, making a plan that allowed him to "practice" for packing for college – he chose seven plastic bins and committed to fitting all of his belongings in those bins, nothing more.

If you were to be a fly on our wall now, you would often hear one of us exclaiming, "It feels so spacious in here!" We feel like we can breathe, like our lives have expanded and with that physical expansion, our minds and hearts are free to expand as well.

We have to be vigilant, of course, to not fill up that spaciousness with more *stuff*, and sometimes we do better than others. But then we just make another Goodwill run and get back on track, always asking ourselves, "Does this make me happy?" We are learning that simplicity is not about depriving ourselves of things, but about making sure that the things we do have are worth having.



Update From Your Board of Management

It is six o'clock on Sunday, April 25, and we had our congregational meeting this morning. First of all, the Board members want to thank all twenty-six of you who attended the meeting, and the half dozen who expressed their opinions via emails because they could not attend. A strong Hug and a huge Thank-You to all of you for being a part of

this first step toward creating our new form of ministry! Everyone will be heard as we go forward.

I honestly had to take a few minutes today to reread Board Updates in previous newsletters before attempting to write this update, in order to bring my thoughts into focus, so to speak. So much has been talked about over the past few weeks. And now, to continue: at the April 12th Board meeting, Janie centered us with a reading by Anne Lamott. In the area of finances, around \$37,000 in pledges has been received out of \$53,565 total pledged, but expenses have been down in Programming, Pianist, Choir, Childcare, Sewer, and Electricity, because the building is closed - one of the Ironic Blessings of Covid-19. The Minister, Clerk, Liaisons, and Covid Relief Fund gave their reports. Shay had met with Mesha and Ryan and updated us on RE, and it seemed prudent to include \$500 in next year's budget for any RE expenses should the RE program need it. Marcel and the Finance Committee are still finalizing the FY 2021-2022 budget details. We were visited by Katherine Blouin Adams, who is affiliated with the York County Child Abuse and Neglect Council. She is requesting space in our church to hold Summer and Fall training for the public on when and how to report possible abuse issues, and Shay will keep in touch with her about when our building will reopen. The Board will discuss reopening at our May meeting. Our annual Flower Communion service will be on June 13 followed by our Annual Meeting, and hopes are high that we can meet outdoors for both!

There will be further plans made for expanding the Liaison roles, and defining those of the Members At Large who will join the Board in August, possibly to incorporate duties which have been fulfilled by the Caring and the Members and Friends Committees in the past. Any definitive job descriptions will have to wait until the upcoming Small Group congregational meetings reveal how our ministry will look after July. This is a new variety of flower, just coming to bud now, which will open and grow in the coming months. I wish each of you good health and peace, especially as we welcome and cultivate new flowers in our church garden.

Our CMP Usage

Each month our CMP bill lists the # KWh we use and the # KWh we generate with solar panels. In the summer we generate more than we use and in the winter we use more than we generate. But each year we generate more than we use so we "bank" the extra KWh to be available to offset future costs. At this time we have a considerable # of KWh banked so it is expected that ALL OF OUR USAGE will continue to be at NO COST. The only monthly charge for CMP that we incur every month is a service charge of \$16.31

I calculated what the cost for CMP would have been had we paid for actual usage. The savings realized for 2020 as a result of solar panels was 1,089.87. The savings would have been more had the church been open; we would have used more electricity! ~ Marcel Gagnon, Church Treasurer



Sanford UU Church Book Group

The SUUC book group will discuss Anne Lamott's newest book in our May meeting (May 14, 2021 at 4:30 p.m. on Zoom). In *Dusk, Night, Dawn*, Anne Lamott explores the tough questions that many of us grapple with. How can we recapture the confidence we once had as we stumble through the dark times that seem increasingly bleak? As bad news piles up—from climate crises to daily assaults on civility—how can we cope? We begin, Lamott says, by accepting our flaws and embracing our humanity. Drawing from her own experiences, Lamott shows us the intimate and human ways we can adopt to move through life's dark places and toward the light of hope that still burns ahead for all of us.

Lamott explores the thorny issues of life and faith by breaking them down into manageable, human-sized questions for readers to ponder, in the process showing us how we can amplify life's small moments of joy by staying open to love and connection. As Lamott notes in *Dusk, Night, Dawn*, "I got Medicare three days before I got hitched, which sounds like something an old person might do, which does not describe adorably ageless me." Marrying for the first time with a grown son and a grandson, Lamott explains that finding happiness with a partner isn't a function of age or beauty but of outlook and perspective.

Full of the honesty, humor, and humanity that have made Lamott beloved by millions of readers, *Dusk, Night, Dawn* is classic Anne Lamott—thoughtful and comic, warm and wise—and further proof that Lamott truly speaks to the better angels in all of us.


*This is a hopeful tentative date dependent on Covid restrictions and guidance. If you RSVP, you will be notified of any changes.

This month we have continued to respond to individuals who contact us expressing needs for non-food items. We got 1 referral from the Covid Relief Team, and were also able to bring her a box of food from the York County Shelter program.

We made 2 deliveries to the pantry at the Sanford Adult Education site in Springvale. Thanks to Jeanne McDonald they have been able to offer adult students food and winter clothing in addition to the non-food items.

We have begun talking with Rev. Lauren from St. George's Episcopal Church about working with them to offer items through their Baby Blessings Program, which currently offers diapers, wipes, and gift cards to moms in need. We have shared some additional supplies with them and we will see how they are received before deciding how to proceed.
