Rev. Shay's Sharing...

As I said in my sermon on May 23rd:

The very first sermon I shared with you, in the Sanford sanctuary at the beginning of candidating week three years ago, I told you about my dream of the singing stones, in which we chose each other by listening for the songs that were only ours to sing.



Our dreaming of new ministry, of two unique and blessed communities joining the journey with a new minister, coming together to create a new, vibrant story, your dreaming of partnership and support and collaboration in the shared ministry of this community, was a beginning of a new story.

And our dreamings brought us here, to this place, with each other. Our dreamings held the first notes of a new song – a new vision – a *shared* creation, built on affection and respect, honoring all of our pasts while opening to the wonder of the new world we were going to create together. My dreamings, and yours, created songlines; songlines that guided us as we explored new terrain, that revealed to us what it means to be on this journey together. Through creativity and cooperation, courage and compassion, we shaped this story, this shared ministry, and were shaped by it.

These years were our dreaming time, in which we all, together, created the songlines that guided us as we moved forward toward a shared vision. You, as a community, are now preparing to enter another dreaming time – a time of unknowing and uncertainty in the newness of things, as am I. Be patient! Be kind! Be silent sometimes and learn to listen! Allow everyone's voices to speak, to be heard, to move you. Let others hear your songs, and the wonder and joy all of you are so very capable of expressing.

We each have something special to offer in the creation of this new world, you each have a particular part only you can sing – and…none of it works if what we put forth forgets that the larger vision is what we are all about here.

This is not about power or personal gain. There will be moments when one voice, or a few, sing high above the chorus, sharing wisdom, insight, perspective, and ingenuity. But, if ever any voice loses the melody of the shared song, we, as a community, will encourage a renewed effort at harmony. It will take all of us to sing the world we want into being.

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Rev. Shay's Sharing Continued...

I'd like to believe that Life is constantly offering us invitations to create great music with others. Sometimes this music is joyful and sometimes it's not. In our listening for the songs of others, we will sometimes be challenged or feel threatened. Listen more carefully, especially then! When we disagree, when we misunderstand each other, when we are dealing with prejudices or fears or deep wounds, it is more important than ever to listen deeply, quieting our own assumptions and judgments and agendas. By listening in this way, we facilitate communication, collaboration, and respect. By listening in this way, we facilitate harmony.

May we, whether we are here together or separated by many miles, move together, our voices blending, finding expression for all the music our hearts long to sing. Make room as new voices join and others fade away.

I am now saying goodbye to you, gradually withdrawing my voice from the choir of this community, allowing us all to feel the sadness in that loss, and in that letting go enabling our hearts to begin listening for the notes of a different song, trusting that the breath of Spirit moves gently among us always, singing softly, an exhalation of Love.

With love, I thank you for letting me sing with you these past three years, and for the work you do to create Great Music that echoes throughout the world. I am deeply grateful for this time with you, and very much looking forward to listening from afar as your song continues with new voices, new harmonies, and new rhythms.

Don't ever stop doing the work you do to create beautiful, great music that echoes throughout the world.

Relief Committee Update



This month, the Covid Relief Fund team has approved two individual requests, which are pending estimates from the individuals. Also, Southern Maine Area Agency on Aging requested funds to pay for much-needed technical support to keep confined seniors in touch with family and friends, the Phone Pal program to lessen seniors' anxiety, and virtual support for their caregivers. In addition, SMAAA has scheduled 1,600 vaccination appointments and delivered 1,877 meals to home-bound seniors, an increase of 40% since March, 2020. Our church deserves to be proud of how the Fund came to the aid of older local residents! There is still some money in the account, so please let a team member know of any need. Stay well.

Our Beloved SUUC Community

Covenant of Right Relations

Preamble

We enter this Covenant of Right Relations with open hearts and open minds.

To covenant with one another is to engage in the spiritual and everyday practice of loving better. Although this document expresses our written promise to each other, our true covenant lives and breathes in our actions. In times of growth we will use it to deepen our bonds with one another; during times when we are loving well, it will inspire us to love better; and in times of conflict, we will use it to guide us. We expect this document to be challenging, and we also expect it to inspire us to strengthen our relationships and deepen our sense of community.

Our Living Practices

(examples given by the congregation are in italics)

Radical Hospitality

We accept one another in all our complexity and diversity, fostering a multicultural and multigenerational community. We embrace radical hospitality, welcoming all those who enter, seeing diversity in all its manifestations as a sign of strength.

Greet people warmly, get acquainted with others; treat visitors as fellow worshipers; welcome newcomers into conversations; treat one another kindly outside of church as well as inside. Engage with those who are different from us; challenge bigotry in all its forms; work to empower those who are disempowered; actively confront our assumptions through critical and studied examination of the forces that disadvantage some and privilege others.

Respectful Listening and Speaking

We embrace listening and communication, cultivate active listening, sincere understanding, a culture of gratitude, and compassionate honesty using care-filled language. We trust one another's intentions and recognize that our behaviors have an impact regardless of our intentions.

Assume that people have good intentions; listen intentionally and compassionately; encourage people to speak without blaming or judging them when they do; ask open, honest questions; remember that respectful listening is especially important during meetings.

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Compassionate Conflict Resolution

We embrace conflict resolution – we communicate directly with one another, especially when we are in conflict and, when necessary, consider conflict resolution with a mediator. When conflict is not addressed, it festers and grows.

Make every effort to settle differences directly and openly; stay engaged with each other through difficult conversations; hold ourselves responsible for hearing all sides; be willing to come back into covenant.

Reconciliation and Forgiveness

We embrace reconciliation and forgiveness. When we are hurt or hurt others, we seek reconnection and/or forgiveness. When we engage in reconciliation, we invite change that will transform a relationship. Reconciliation transforms individuals by bringing the parties to a new consciousness of the way they see, treat, and interact with each other.

Acknowledge our own and others' imperfections; forgive ourselves and others; be accountable for keeping our promises; lovingly call each other to account for behavior that is hurtful to others; seek restitution; develop the courage, confidence and will to reconcile and forgive.

Generosity of Service and Accountability

We embrace service and accountability. We are responsible for ourselves and are accountable to one another for creating opportunities to encourage, challenge, and connect. We serve our church and local community with generosity and good humor, working to create social justice. We acknowledge the service of others.

Honor all levels of service to the church; solicit the input of others; encourage people to make choices that balance their needs with the needs of others; help others identify the right level of engagement for them; invite others to join us in our activities; honor the right of others to say no; see service as mission-driven; be planful and deliberate in our efforts, setting clear priorities; acknowledge equitably all service done by the congregation.

Closing

Through these choices and actions, we realize the interconnected network of both mutuality and responsibility to each other and to our beloved community – we support each other in times of joy and need; we pledge to accompany one another on the journeys we face publicly and privately; and we acknowledge that learning to live covenantally is an ongoing process.

Explanation of "vote to dissolve Rev. Shay's call to settled ministry and letter of agreement." The Boards of SUUC and UUCSB, along with Rev. Shay MacKay, have agreed to end Shay's employment as our called settled minister effective the end of this fiscal year, June 30. As this is a mutual agreement, neither a firing or a resignation, all that is needed to officially end this agreement is a majority vote by both congregations. If either congregation wishes to continue to work with Rev. Shay, it will be through a contractual agreement.
